
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Youth Farm Bible Camp

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When you said,
 "Seek My Face."
 my heart said to
 You. "Your face, O
 Lord, I shall seek."
 -Psalm 27:8

The theme that was chosen for our ministry year was **Behold!** This is a word that is used often in the Bible but not so much in everyday language. We find our Lord approaching His people, Israel, saying **Behold!** and following with a story of His faithfulness or a coming promise. This continues in the New Testament with the presentation of the God Child and angels proclaiming the upcoming birth of the Messiah.

"**Behold!** The virgin will be with child and give birth to a son!"
 Matthew 1:23.

God uses these **Behold!** moments to invite us into relationship. He wants us to Seek His Face, to spend time

with Him and to have communion with Him. As staff of YFBC this theme taught us what is most important - to Seek God's Face - to sit down with God and know him intimately. In a crazy busy culture, with never ending deadlines, it seems hard to respond to the **Behold!**

moments. But we must! We must put priority as people of God to sit at His feet. Why would we want to go to heaven if we do not want to spend time with God while we are on this earth? We must seek the face of God, We must spend time in communion with God.

One of the most powerful **Behold!** moments in the Bible is found when



Jesus calls Peter out of the boat and to walk towards Him. Before this, the disciples had been gripped with fear in a storm on the Sea of Galilee. Jesus

was not with them. He was spending time seeking the face of His Father. Now He joins His disciples on the sea and calls from afar saying "Don't be afraid, Take courage, Behold, I am here." Peter responds by saying "if it is really you, tell me to come to you,

walking on water". Peter saw Jesus, had courage and wanted to join Jesus in what He was doing. Do we have that kind of courage? Can we join with Jesus in what He is doing in our world?

Peter gets out of the boat, jumps on the water, looks toward Jesus and starts to walk! A miracle! Then he takes his eyes off of Jesus and starts to sink. He calls out and Jesus immediately saves Peter and joins him in the boat.

Jesus calms the storm and the disciples are awestruck. They worship their Lord and declare "You really are the Son of God!"

We need to fix our eyes on Jesus - the Son of God. As we look towards Jesus we will be transformed into the same image, from glory to glory. It is the only way to live in this world -to make sense of this world.

God calls us to seek His face in our conversion to Him and in our conversations with Him. He calls us, by the whispers of His Spirit to our spirits, to seek His face.

1. Camps we run

We are excited to welcome children to camp as young as age 5. We offer day camps for little ones, ages 5-8, wanting to sleep in their own beds at night. Once campers are ready for overnight camp they can join us for one of our kids camps, ages 6-12. But teens want to be a part of camp too! We have junior teen camp, teen trail ride, and horse focused day camps.

Since the 1980's YFBC has also run and expanded our camp program for adults with special needs - running 5 weeks throughout the summer. This is a powerful program that sees people with intellectual disabilities looking forward to there week of camp.

2. Activities

Making use of this amazing farm yard YFBC sits on, we run outdoor activities everyone will enjoy. Let me list them for you (ok, maybe not ALL of them, but here is a start.) Horse riding, swimming, archery, wide games, canoeing, jumbo pillow, climbing wall, water games, corn maze, petting zoo, and low ropes.

Because we desire for Christ to be the centre of what we do here at YFBC, after breakfast we start the day with chapel and end each day with campfire, a time for singing and a Bible story from our camp pastor.

3. Get Involved

Maybe you are too old for camp or you have a desire to serve here at YFBC. There are a few opportunities for you! Our junior staff program runs for young leaders, ages 14-18, wanting to help out in the cabin, the kitchen, or the horse program. Summer staff positions are for anyone finished high school. And we can always use kitchen helpers!

The group of 24 people that travelled by air and bus built another home for a family in Tijuana by partnering with Amor Ministries. It was an amazing week with a team that worked hard, had a lot of fun, and dove deeper into questions of missions through Steve Corbett's "When Helping Hurts."

We were so blessed to have such amazing weather while we were working, and the house was situated in a place with easy access

to everything we needed to complete the task. While I was learning all of my house-building skills on the spot, we had such a talented and experienced team who ensured quality of workmanship.

An exciting part about being in Mexico was connecting with the local church! On Sunday our friend Francisco took us to his church where many of us experienced worship different than what we're used to- in Spanish, a lot of dancing, and a few hours longer. While building the house one day I had the opportunity to meet the pastor of the church that this family belonged to. He was so excited that as brothers and sisters in Christ we could be blessing

members of his congregation by fulfilling a practical need such as a house! While cultural norms may differ from our Canadian practices, the truth and love of Jesus transcends all language and cultural barriers.

The day of handing over the keys is often an emotional experience, as the family is so grateful, we are so sad to say goodbye, and we all step back to give God glory for everything. The family had served us with cold refreshments all week and participated in helping to build their home. It was so humbling to bless our family in Christ, but in reality we walked away having been equally as blessed.

No one leaves these impact trips the same as they came. So many lessons I learnt there that I want to continually try to incorporate in my daily life. I learnt these from the Mexican people, the staff at Amor, and the fantastic team we had. I came away with learning more about passion, joy and humility when approaching Jesus, thankfulness and contentment for the things I have and a heart of selflessness and generosity.

Mexico Trip and ASN Camp collide!

I had the opportunity to go on the Mexico Mission Trip this year. It had been a dream of mine to go to Mexico, so I was really excited when Mark told me I could come along.

The first thing I noticed when we crossed the border into Tijuana is that the houses were a lot smaller and older than what we have here in Canada. It made me sad to see that people were living like this; I had never seen anything like it. I feel bad for people that do not have a lot. I realized that I have a lot and am very blessed.

I had experience building houses before, so this helped me when we were building the house in Tijuana. The difference between here and there is that here there were cement trucks to mix and pour concrete pads and there were power tools to use. Over there, we mixed cement by hand and used hand tools to do all the work. It was harder to do everything by manual labour.

The family we built the house for was friendly. They tried talking to me, but of course, I could not understand Spanish! There was a

local Mexican man that was with us for the week; he helped a lot by translating for us. I was given a gift by the family: a handkerchief embroidered with a peacock. I was moved to tears by their kindness. In response, I gave each of them a toque that I knit myself. Those were really special moments for me.

At the end of the build, the family shared how appreciative they were of receiving the house. They told us that they were praying to get a new house, and so when we arrived to build one for them, that was an amazing answer to prayer. When I heard that, I was excited, and it taught me that God answers prayer. I also felt God telling me that I should pray for this family when I get back home.

I learned a lot on this trip and would recommend that everybody should do something like this. I have so many good memories and experiences from doing this. By being in Mexico, I saw that some families are poor and need a house. That is why I will pray for these people every day, because God loves them and He answers prayer.

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Youth Farm Corn Maze

For the last 10 years, the Corn Maze has been a great attraction at our camp! Families have come and enjoyed their experiences.

The hardest part about this year's event was that the weather was so poor in September. There were many weekends of cool weather and rain. The blessing of lower numbers was our ability to connect more with the families that were coming out.

This year we found that many of our attenders were coming back from previous years. People who knew what we had to offer would come during poor

weather. First timers did not want to take the chance when presented with bad weather. We were blessed by all the returning customers.

We also had many youth groups and school groups coming out. We had a blast providing programming for these people. Around 80% of our school groups were from First Nation Reserves, some travelling four hours to come out. These kids would be in a bus so long that they totally embraced every activity they could do at our farm.

The basement cafe provided 1000s of cups of hot chocolate

and a place for people to warm up and socialize. There was honey, apples, sauces, jams, candles, art, crafts, and more at the gift shop to purchase from local suppliers. There was also candy, mini donuts, nachos, corn dogs and much more to purchase for a quick snack.

Every year we have seen growth in the Corn Maze. This year it was not in the amount of revenue that came in but the experience we were able to offer to the guests that chose to visit. We are already excited about what next year will bring and would love to have you volunteer during the 2019 season.



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Equine Assisted Learning

This past winter we were able to find funding to support one school group to attend Equine Assisted Learning (EAL) sessions. As a reminder, EAL is under the umbrella of equine therapy, which uses horses as a form of personal development to teach people life skills. The riding lesson and EAL program continued at Matali (a riding arena by Hague) until April, at which time we moved the lesson horses back home to Valley Equestrian Centre to begin our summer schedule.

This winter we will have our own indoor riding arena available on our camp site! This will allow us to increase our EAL programming. We are looking for churches, individuals and community groups to help provide funding in order to provide EAL to schools in our surrounding communities. Our next step will be to

develop an EAL program for people suffering from PTSD as well as a specific EAL session for teens with anxiety. We have seen the value of EAL and how much of an impact it can be to behavioural issues in a school classroom. The teachers and school administrators are very excited about the program that we are setting up!

In addition to running horse skills for children's and ASN camps, we expanded our horse day-camps from 2 to 4 weeks. This included one camp which was specifically focused on jumping. With the extra help for the camp programming, I was able to continue teaching riding lessons to the


public in the evenings and even take on a few training horses. The lesson horse herd was expanded, including acquiring some talented new lesson horses capable of teaching jumping lessons.

Building a new program requires promotion, networking, and of course, fundraising. We hosted quite a few fundraisers this year! In May we ran a Gymkhana, which was a HUGE hit and all participants asked when we would be hosting another. We were host to one Working Equitation clinic along with three play days in partnership with Kim Jungman. Working Equitation is a new sport in Canada. In June we went retro and brought back the Ride-a-thon, which was held at Eb's Trails. The VEC students were given the opportunity to ride their favourite lesson horses, and members of the community brought their own and joined us. In September we organized a Hunter Derby – essentially, cross country jumping –which brought out some new riders to the Youth Farm!

Now at this point, you may wonder, but where was the Lord in all of this? Every

day, every moment, HE is here. At VEC we use the Lord's wondrous creation, the horse, to touch, to enlighten, to improve, to better people's lives. I see this when a child who struggles with anxiety is able to connect with a horse in a way that she hasn't been able to connect with her peers. And then again, when this connection begins to inspire the child, improving her self-esteem, and later, her interactions with others. I see God's work when a child who gives up at the very moment something begins to look difficult chooses to spend a half hour trying to catch his horse because he told himself he won't give up on Tucker (the horse's name). The work on people's lives that is being done is God's work, not mine; the horse and I are merely vessels.
